#### Dear Brothers and Sisters,

And so, after all the fuss and effort, it's now passed.

We had just celebrated the Lord's Nativity and His Baptism in the Jordan River, Theophany; the coming of the Savior into the world, His Incarnation, the beginning of His public ministry of teaching. It seemed that we were barely able to catch our breath, and as if unexpectedly our Mother the Church began preparing us for the coming of Great Lent!



We heard Gospel lessons about Zacchaeus climbing a tree just to see this "Jesus of Nazareth"; the Publican and Pharisee, two good men in the temple with different attitudes toward their spiritual lives (who we would call fellow parishioners on any given Sunday morning); how we will be judged on whether we loved everyone: etc. These were all to prepare us, to remind us of how we had to make adjustments in our own lives.

Then came the Great Lent and the Holy Week of the Lord's Passion with intensified fasting, particularly solemn services, admonishment to "do better", to give more. Ah, then came the unforgettably glorious Pascha when the Light of the Risen Christ shattered the (Midnight) darkness of the world... Then, the Lord's Ascension in order to prepare a place for us at the Father's side... and finally, the Descent of the Holy Spirit in the form of fire and wind, Pentecost.

It's always good to look back to where we 've been. All those days were, for those who immersed themselves into the ascetic life of the Church, who tried to be more faithful, who made the effort to grow in their understanding and practice of their faith, those weeks and months were challenging, yet joyful, perhaps difficult but invigorating.

And so, after all the fuss and effort seem to be passed, now what? Now that we've returned to what the Church calls normal time, the time after Pentecost, now what?

Beloved, all that the Church did for us from those preparatory Sundays before Lent until today, the time after Pentecost, all she ever does is lead us on our way, she guides us in "the Way" of Jesus Christ who is "the Way" of life as God intends for us, the Way that promises true, everlasting Life, joy beyond our capacity to understand or imagine. She, as the Lord Himself, never forces us. She wants us to "RECEIVE THE LIGHT!" in order to LIVE IN THE LIGHT of Christ, to PASS THE LIGHT of Christ to others. Our children and other family members, our friends and those we've never met before also need to see the Light we received, with all its joy, peace, love, and forgiveness. Isn't that what we sing at every Divine Liturgy, that "We have seen the true Light. We have received the heavenly Spirit."?

Beloved, it's not a question of "now what". It's a matter of whether we ourselves have taken it all seriously, if it has made any difference in our lives. If so, then we need to go out into the world around us, as apostles on a mission, to let the burning Light of Christ be seen and received by others.

# SAINTS & FEASTS OF THE SEASON

"Blessed are You O Christ Our God who has revealed the fishermen to be most wise; by sending down upon them the Holy Spirit..."



The Feast of Holy Pentecost is celebrated each year on the fiftieth day after the Great and Holy Feast of Pascha (Easter) and ten days after the Feast of the Ascension of Christ. The Feast is always celebrated on a Sunday.

# PEHTECOST

O Heavenly King, Comforter, Spirit of Truth, who are present everywhere, fulfilling all things; the Treasury of Blessings and source of Life, come and abide in us and cleanse us from all stain and save our souls, O Good One.

The Feast commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles on the day of Pentecost, a feast of the Jewish tradition. It also celebrates the establishment of the Church through the preaching of the Apostles and the baptism of the thousands who on that day believed in the Gospel message of salvation through Jesus Christ. The Feast is also seen as the culmination of the revelation of the Holy Trinity.

This great Feast of the Church is celebrated with the Divine Liturgy of Saint John Chrysostom on the Sunday that is the fiftieth day after the celebration of Pascha. The Liturgy is conducted on the day of the Feast, and is preceded the evening before by a Great Vespers service and on the morning of the Feast by the Matins service. On the day of the Feast a Vespers service is served, usually just after the main Liturgy, that includes the kneeling prayers. These prayers mark the beginning of the practice of kneeling during the Liturgy at the time when the holy gifts of bread and wine are consecrated as the body and blood of Christ. The practice of kneeling has been suspended during the Paschal season. On the Monday following the Feast, the Divine Liturgy is conducted in commemoration of the All-holy and Life-creating and All-powerful Spirit, Who is God, and One of the Trinity, and of one honor and one essence and one glory with the Father and the Son (From the Synaxarion of the Feast).

# HOLY EMPEROR CONSTANTINE & HIS MOTHER HELEN | May 21

This renowned sovereign of Christians was the son of Constantius Chlorus (ruler of the westernmost parts of the Roman empire), and of the blessed Helen. He was born in 272. In 306, when his father died, he was proclaimed successor to his throne. In 312, on learning that Maxentius and Maximinus had joined forces against him, he marched into Italy, where, while at the head of his troops, he saw in the sky after midday, beneath the sun, a radiant pillar in the form of a cross with the words: "By this shalt thou conquer." The following night, our Lord appeared to him in a dream and declared the power of the Cross and its significance. When he arose in the morning, he ordered that a labarum be made (which is a banner or standard of victory over the enemy) in the form of a cross, and he inscribed on it the Name of Jesus Christ. On October 28 he attacked and conquered Maxentius, who drowned in the Tiber River while fleeing. The following day, Constantine entered Rome in triumph and was proclaimed Emperor of the West by the Senate, while Licinius, his brother-in-law, ruled in the East. But out of malice, Licinius later persecuted the Christians. Constantine fought him once and again, and utterly destroyed him in 324, and in this manner he became monarch over the West and the East. Because of him all the persecutions against the Church ceased. Christianity triumphed and idolatry was overthrown.

In 325 he gathered the First Ecumenical Council in Nicaea, which he himself personally addressed. In 324, in the ancient city of Byzantium, he laid the foundations of the new capital of his realm, and solemnly inaugurated it on May 11, 330, naming it after himself, Constantinople. Since the throne of the imperial rule was transferred to Constantinople from Rome, it was named New Rome, the inhabitants of its domain were called Romans. and it was considered the continuation of the Roman Empire. Falling ill near Nicomedia, he requested to receive divine Baptism, according to Eusebius, and also according to Socrates and Sozomen; and when he had been deemed worthy of the Holy Mysteries, he reposed in 337, on May 21 or 22, the day of Pentecost, having lived sixty-five years, of which he ruled for thirty-one years. His remains were transferred to Constantinople and were deposed in the Church of the Holy Apostles, which had been built by him.

As for his holy mother Helen (Elena), after her son had made the Faith of Christ triumphant throughout the Roman Empire, she undertook a journey to Jerusalem and found the Holy Cross on which our Lord was crucified (see September 13 and 14).

After this, Saint Helen, in her zeal to glorify Christ, erected churches in Jerusalem at the sites of the Crucifixion and Resurrection, in Bethlehem at the cave where our Saviour was born, another on the Mount of Olives whence He ascended into



Heaven, and many others throughout the Holy Land, Cyprus, and elsewhere. She was proclaimed Augusta, her image was stamped upon golden coins, and two cities were named Helenopolis after her in Bithynia and in Palestine. Having been thus glorified for her piety, she departed to the Lord being about eighty years of age, according to some in the year 330, according to others, in 336.

# Understanding THE HOLY TRINITY

This essay on the Holy Trinity by the author is based on seminary study with Fr. Thomas Hopko. Pentecost / Trinity Sunday is dedicated to the Feast of the Holy Trinity (called "Troitse" in Russian and Ukrainian) and the second day, Spirit Monday, celebrates the Descent of the Holy Spirit.

rthodox Christians believe in and worship the Holy Trinity. After receiving Holy Communion we boldly exclaim, "We have found the true Faith.... worshipping the undivided Trinity, Who has saved us." Even though the term "Holy Trinity" is not found in the Bible, the Holy Trinity is biblical — all the books of the New Testament (and some of the books of the Old Testament) speak about the relationship between the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.

The Trinity was manifested for the first time in a clear way when Jesus Christ was baptized in the Jordan by John the Baptist. "And when Jesus was baptized, He went up immediately from the water, and behold, the heavens were opened and He saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove, and alighting on Him; and lo, a voice from

heaven, saying, 'This is my beloved Son, with Whom I am well pleased'" (Matthew 3:14-15). The main hymn of the feast of Theophany explains this event: "When Thou, O Lord, wast baptized in the Jordan, the worship of the Trinity was made manifest! For the voice of the Father bore witness to Thee, calling Thee His beloved Son. And the Spirit, in the form of a dove, confirmed the truthfulness of His word. O Christ our God, Who has revealed Thyself and hast enlightened the world, glory to Thee."

We bless ourselves with the sign of the cross saying, "Glory to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit." The words "and to the" in this doxology are there for a reason. The Holy Trinity is a relationship between three divine Persons (the words "and to the" preserves this distinction) Who are united by divine Love. We can, in a simple way, think of the phrase, 'and to the' as the love that unites the three Persons. The biblical verse, "God is Love" (1 John 4:8), is very profound.

God is not a mathematical "one"—if He were, He would not be Love, but would be the opposite of love. We know this from our own human experience—when we are alone with no one to relate to it is not good— in fact, it often is hell. God Himself said after creating Adam, "It is not good for Adam to be alone" (Genesis 1:26). Human beings have been created in the image and likeness of the Holy Trinity. God said, "Let us make man in our image, after our likeness (Genesis 1:26) and not "Let me make man in my image according to my

likeness." Since the Godhead is a plurality of divine Persons of the same divine nature, God has created human beings as male and female—a plurality of persons of the same human nature. "So God created man in His own image, in the image of God He created them" (Genesis1:27)

In the Old and New Testaments the term "God" generally refers to the Person of the Father (except in a few cases where "God" is used in the generic sense of divinity—such is the case with John 1:1, "And the Word was God"). We can, therefore, substitute the term "Father" for most places where "God" is found in the Bible. When we do this we can see more clearly the relationships between the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. For instance, we often read and hear the term "Son of God." This term, therefore, means "Son of the Father" and clearly shows a relationship between the Father and the Son. When we read "God's Son" we can render it as "the Father's Son." When we read "God's Spirit" we can render it as "the Father's Spirit." All these terms, as well as "Spirit of the Son," are biblical and show the relationship between the Persons of the Holy Trinity.

# "NO ONE PERSON OF THE TRINITY EVER ACTS ALONE WITHOUT THE CONSENT AND ACTION OF THE OTHERS, BECAUSE THEY ALL SHARE THE SELF-SAME DIVINE WILL."

The term "God the Father" is biblical, but the terms "God the Son" and "God the Holy Spirit" are NOT. Many people, many of whom pride themselves on their knowledge of the Bible, use the terms "God the Father," "God the Son," and "God the Holy Spirit" when speaking of the Holy Trinity. This is WRONG because the relationships between the divine Persons (which is essential in our Orthodox Christian understanding of the Holy Trinity) are destroyed and the temptation to think of God in terms of "Modalism" becomes present. "Modalism" is the ancient heresy that said that the one God expresses Himself in three different ways. This heresy says that God the Father can shift into a different "mode" and express Himself as God the Son or God the Holy Spirit at different times.

The terms, Father, Son and Holy Spirit are not terms which a patriarchal (male dominated) society has pinned on God, but rather are terms which God has given us as being most appropriate to express the reality of what is happening in the Trinitarian Godhead. We cannot substitute "inclusive language" terms such as "Mother" and "Daughter" or "Creator" [for "Father"], "Redeemer" [for "Son"], and "Sanctifier" [for "Spirit"], because these terms lead to a false understanding of the relationships between the three divine Persons.

Every action of God is a Trinitarian action. No one Person of the Trinity ever acts alone without the consent and action of the others, because they all share the self-same Divine Will. A good example of this is the creation of the universe. The Father is not the Creator alone. He creates by means of His Son (His Word)) and Spirit. "In the beginning, God [the Father] created the heavens and earth. The earth was without form and void, and darkness was over the face of the deep; and the Spirit of God [the Holy Spirit] was moving over the face of the waters. And God said [God's Word], 'Let there be light'; and there was light" (Genesis 1:1-3). St. Paul made it clear that the Son was involved in creation when he wrote, "All things were created through Him [the Son] and for Him. He is before all things, and in Him all things hold together" (Colossians 1:16-17).

Although the Father is the Source (Principle or Cause) of the Son and the Holy Spirit, He alone has always been "Father." There was never a time when the Father was "alone in His divinity" without His Son and Spirit. There was never a time when the Son was not (this is the heresy of "Arianism"), and there was never a time when the Spirit was not. The Holy Trinity simply exists and always has existed. The Old Testament name for God, "I Am," expresses this (see Exodus 3:14). The Trinity is not the result of a process—God does not change and cannot "improve." Human beings, on the other hand, have been created to change "from one degree of glory to another" (2 Corinthians 3:18) and to become "perfect as your heavenly Father is perfect (Matthew 5:48).

The Holy Trinity is eternal, where "eternal" is understood to mean existence in "timelessness" and "spacelessness." Time and space are created entities and God does not need them to exist. Because God created time and space, He is not constrained by them. The Creator is stronger than His creation—and this is why God can see

the past, present and future all at once and can be everywhere "at the same time."

The Son of God is eternally born of the Father (we use the biblical term "begotten" to refer to this: John 1:14) and the Spirit eternally comes forth from the Father (we use the biblical term "proceeds" to refer to this: John 15:26). We cannot use the term "begotten" to refer to the manner in which the Spirt comes forth from the Father because that would wrongly imply that the Father has two Sons.

We often hear the phrase "one in essence" in our Church. We say every Sunday when we recite/sing the Nicene Creed that the Son of God is "of one essence with the Father." We also sing every Sunday the hymn, "Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, the Trinity, one in essence and undivided." This phrase, "one in essence," is the English translation of the Greek word "homoousios," which is a theological term developed by the Fathers of the First Ecumenical Council (at Nicaea in 325 A.D.) to express how the Son is exactly what the Father is. The Son of God is "true God of true God" as we say in the Nicene Creed. The Son is exactly what the Father is in terms of His divine attributes and divine Nature, but He is not Him! The only difference is that the Father is the Father, and the Son is the Son, and the Spirit is the Spirit! Note that Jesus Christ, the Son of God made man, is not only "homoousios" with the Father, but He is also "homoousios" with us! Jesus Christ is both fully divine and fully human (He is therefore the "God-Man").

Because the Son of God is "of one essence with the Father," Jesus Christ can say, "I and the Father are one" (John10:30) and "He who has seen me has seen the Father" (John 14:9). All the attributes relative to the Father's being belong also to the Son. Jesus Christ "is the likeness of God" (2 Corinthians 4:4) and we can see "the glory of God in the face of Christ" (2 Corinthians 4:6). The Son is the radiance of the Father's glory. The Son is God's perfect self-expression—God's Life, God's Power, God's Word, God's Wisdom, etc. "Christ is the power of God and the wisdom of God" (1 Corinthians 1:24).

joined by others, with a desire to provide action-oriented and sustainable solutions to poverty in communities across America. As



# NEWS from around the Orthodox World...

#### **DIGITAL MEDIA & PASTORAL CARE EVENT**

[ATHENS, GREECE] - The 1st International Conference on Digital Media and Orthodox Pastoral Care took place May 7-9 in Athens. 72 speakers took part (clergy and laity), with many specialists in Internet use from 21 countries.

The proceedings of the conference were held under the auspices of His All-Holiness Bartholomew, the Ecumenical Patriarch and had the blessing of the local metropolitan, His Eminence Pavlos of Glyfada.

A great many issues were raised at the conference regarding the use of the Internet, which is a great human achievement, a means and a tool for our convenience. This means can certainly be used so that the word of God 'can make speed and bear fruit'. At the sessions and round table discussions of these three days, note was taken of the problems and dangers created by imprudent use, but, at the same time, the positive side was also emphasized.

In particular, on the one hand mention was made of the negative aspects of abuse, misuse and the unrealistic expectations aroused by even normal use of the modern digital means of communication and information.

#### **HOLY CROSS PRESIDENT HONORED**

[Brookline MA] - The 73rd Commencement weekend at Hellenic College Holy Cross Greek Orthodox School of Theology was both celebratory and reflective as many gathered to pay tribute to the Rev Nicholas Triantafilou for 15 years of exem-

plary service as president of the institution.

Making the commencement exercises more memorable for all attendees was the conferral of an degree honorary Doctor of Theology to Fr Triantafilou. In accepting the honorary degree of Doctor of Theology honoris causa Archbishop from Demetrios. Triantafilou began by saying,

# PARISH SPOTLIGHT...

# LY CLEWENT OHBIDARI (HUBCH

In the early years of the 20th century, a large number of Bulgarian and Macedonian immigrants were attracted to the Detroit area by jobs in the rapidly growing auto industry. These first immigrants worshipped at Russian or Greek churches.

In 1927, Protoprezviter Dr Krustyu Tsenoff, a missionary priest, came to Detroit. The Macedonians accepted Fr Tsenoff as their spiritual guide and the Holy Synod of the Bulgarian Orthodox Church as their ecclesiastical authority. Our charter members, together with Fr Tsenoff, founded the first Detroit-based Macedonian-Bulgarian parish named Holy Trinity. The first services were held at St John Episcopal Church downtown. In 1929, the new parish built its first church, on 25th Street, near Michigan Avenue. The Liturgy was celebrated every Sunday and Feast Day.

In 1932, Fr Velik Karadjoff organized the Ladies' Club. It appeared for a short time that the new community was thriving. But during the Great Depression the parish was unable to meet the mortgage payment. The church was foreclosed and listed for sale, and the parish was dissolved. Soon after, the Macedonian Political Organization (MPO) "Fatherland" purchased the church properties. On February 17, 1935 the parish was reorganized under the name St Clement Ohridski Macedono-Bulgarian Ortho-


dox Church. Fr George Nicoloff arrived from Bulgaria to lead the newly organized parish that year, and by 1963, plans were being laid for the construction of a new church on Ford Rd in Dearborn, where the church now stands. However, an unfortunate split led to the departure of Fr Nicoloff and several members. Over the years, many have worked to heal these wounds.

The parishioners who remained built a large, three-domed cathedral-like church with Sunday School classrooms and two halls. The cornerstone was laid in 1966 by Metropolitan Andrey. This marked a new beginning for St Clement.

In 1968 Fr Panayot Pamukov became the Parish Priest. He led a long period of

growth, and during his tenure, the church was consecrated in 1976, and the mortgage retired two years later. In 1978, our parish hosted Patriarch Maxim as he visited North America.

Today, the parish is led by Fr Slavcho Panev. An extensive repair / restoration plan is currently being completed, and the parish hopes for a strong future.

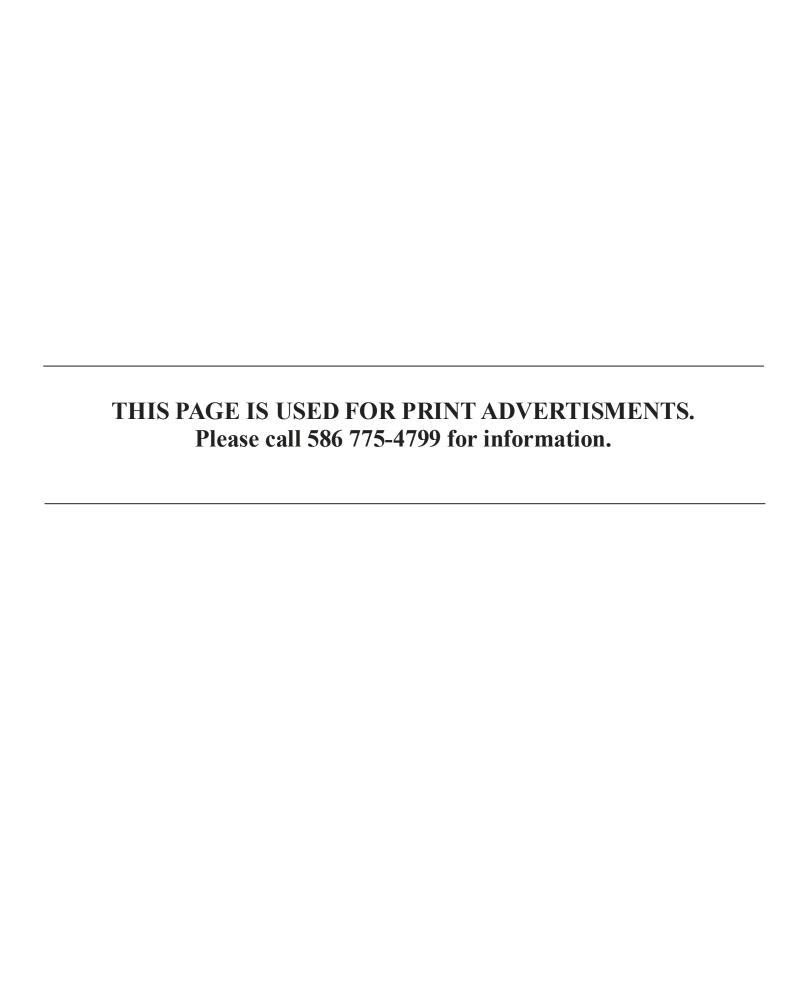

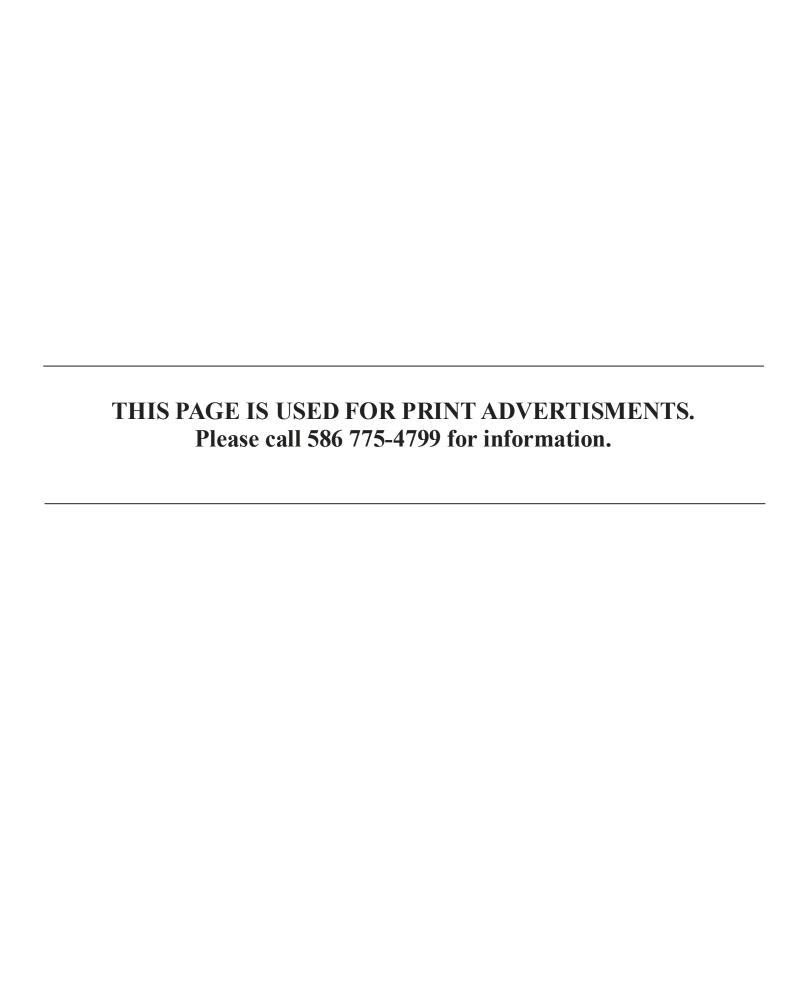


