A Blessed Lent!

The Council of Orthodox Christian Churches (COCC) exists to bring ALL Orthodox parishes and faithful from across our city together, to increase our witness, to strengthen the bonds between us, and to aid in your parish's work. The COCC was founded over 60 years ago and in the last 4 years has worked to develop and support its media ministry through its website presence, the publication of Good Works magazine and the weekly production of our radio program – Detroit's Own Orthodox Radio or DOOR.

Having received the blessings of both His Eminence, Metropolitan Nicholas of the Greek Orthodox Metropolis of Detroit and Archbishop Nathaniel of the Romanian Orthodox Episcopate of America - Detroit's Own Orthodox Radio began broadcasting on Pentecost Sunday, May 31, 2015.

Celebrating an accomplishment We recently marked the 200th episode of our weekly broadcast. Over these past radio 200 episodes, we have interviewed 14 hierarchs of the Orthodox Church, which included Metropolitans, Archbishops and Bishops across many jurisdictions in North America. Interviews have ranged from local community outreach partners such as Focus Detroit, Orthodox Detroit Outreach, Orthodox Christian Women of Michigan, ZOE! For Life to over 32 charities throughout the country and the world. Our interviewees have come from 14 U.S. states along with intriguing segments from 10 countries (Africa, Canada, Egypt, England, Greece, Guatemala,

Lebanon, Romania, Serbia and Scotland). Thank you to all those who have graciously shared their talents, stories and insights throughout the years. As listeners you may be familiar with our recurring features: Practicing Our Faith, Passing the Legacy, Growing in Faith, Book Reviews, Saints of the Day, Wisdom of Our Fathers, Ask Father and Parish Happenings which is a roundup of local parish events. We have also enjoyed featuring the voices of our youngest faithful as they greeted their mothers and grandmothers for our programs on Mother's Day or for the Nativity. These were children from across the area Orthodox parishes, who along with their teachers worked with us to prepare and record the kids reciting poems or singing.

To help mark our 200th program on March 24th, 2019, we created a CD sampler as a gift to our listeners – we selected some excerpts of our various features, interviews and music that listeners have enjoyed on DOOR. Those who were present at the Lenten Vespers series were given this CD. Thank you for listening and supporting the work of the COCC.

Let us continue to work together to share the joys of our faith and hope in the Lord!

Beloved Faithful,

When I was reminded a few minutes ago that this message for Good Works was expected as soon as possible, I immediately sat down and began to wonder what to write.



Well, I won't say how long I sat there, yet at one point I thought that since it is Spring maybe I could start with "Spring is sprung. The grass is riz. I wonder where the birdies is". And then I thought about it again. A couple of times. But, however poetically brilliant that little saying is, however happy the picture it draws in our minds... I decided against using it. So, I was back to the drawing board, hoping for something better, something more pastorally appropriate, something that was more "priestly". And it didn't

take too long for me to think that... The Great, Holy, and Glorious Pascha is almost here, so what can be more appropriate than beginning this note with "Christ is risen! Hristos a inviat! Christos voskrese! Xristos anesti! (Etc.)?

What else can be said? With that blessed reality, all things are renewed, regenerated. Just like the Spring season when the trees begin to bud after losing their leaves and sleeping through the harsh winter weather, the crocus and lilacs and tulips, etc. push through the earth and take bloom in many colors. After months of freezing temperatures, grey skies, snow and ice, the brown tones of nature turn to green once again. All things are made new. As the prayer says, "Joy for the whole world has come through the Cross". Everything is literally resurrected!

Brothers and Sisters, the reality of the Orthodox faith into which we were baptized and chrismated, that is the foundation of all we believe, that is the rock that strengthens us and fills us with peace even through the "winters" of our lives, is proclaimed once again at Pascha. And as St John 'the Golden Mouth' reminds us, the Lord welcomes us whether we have repeatedly fallen, i.e. whether we allowed ourselves to slip away from Him and to fall into a winter of sin and weakness, He nevertheless lovingly welcomes us, pulls us up from the

depths of darkness and gives us new life! That's what Pascha is about. It is the Springtime of our lives! And from here, with renewed hope and energy, commitment, peace, and joy we move forward in union with the Risen Lord, the Savior of our souls, the Almighty God who humbled Himself to become a Man, so that He could raise us up to eternal Life.

So, yes, "Spring is sprung. The grass is riz..." but far more importantly, "Christ is risen from the dead trampling down death by death, and upon those in the tombs bestowing life"!

SAINTS & FEASTS OF THE SEASON



The commemoration of the Third Sunday of Lent is closely parallel to the feasts of the Veneration of the Cross (September 14) and Procession of the Cross (August 1). Not only does the Sunday of the Holy Cross prepare us for the Crucifixion, but it also reminds us that the whole of Lent is a period when we are crucified with Christ.

As we have "crucified the flesh with its passions and desires" (Galatians 5:24), and will have mortified ourselves during these forty days of the Fast, the precious and lifegiving Cross is now placed before us to refresh our souls and encourage us who may be filled with a sense of bitterness, resentment, and depression. The Cross reminds us of the Passion of our Lord, and by presenting to us His example, it encourages us to follow Him in struggle and sacrifice, being refreshed, assured, and comforted. (...)The Cross teaches us that through pain and suffering we shall see the fulfillment of our hopes: the heavenly inheritance and eternal glory.

As they who walk on a long and hard way and are bowed down by fatigue find great relief and strengthening under the cool shade of a leafy tree, so do we find comfort, refreshment, and rejuvenation under the Life-giving Cross, which our Fathers "planted" on this Sunday. Thus, we are fortified and enabled to continue our Lenten journey with a light step, rested and encouraged.

Or, as before the arrival of the king, his royal standards, trophies, and emblems of victory come in procession and then the king himself appears in a triumphant parade, jubilant and rejoicing in his victory and filling those under him with joy, so does the Feast of the Cross precede the coming of our King, Jesus Christ. It warns us that He is about to proclaim His victory over death and appear to us in the glory of the Resurrection.

As the Cross is called the Tree of Life, it is placed in the middle of the Fast, as the ancient tree of life was placed in the middle of the garden of Eden. By this, our Holy Fathers wished to remind us of Adam's gluttony as well as the fact that through this Tree has condemnation been abolished. Therefore, if we bind ourselves to the Holy Cross, we shall never encounter death but shall inherit life eternal. *goarch.org*



ENTRANCE OF THE LORD IN JERUSALEM

On the Sunday before Holy Pascha and at the beginning of Holy Week, the Orthodox Church celebrates one of its most joyous feasts of the year. Palm Sunday is the commemoration of the Entrance of our Lord into Jerusalem following His glorious miracle of raising Lazarus from the dead. Having anticipated His arrival and having heard of the miracle, the people went out to meet the Lord and welcomed Him with displays of honor and shouts of praise. On this day, we receive and worship Christ in this same manner, acknowledging Him as our King and Lord.

The biblical story is recorded in all four of the Gospels. Five days before the Passover, Jesus came from Bethany to Jerusalem. Having sent two of His disciples to bring Him a colt of a donkey, Jesus sat upon it and entered the city. People had gathered in Jerusalem for the Passover and were looking for Jesus, both because of His great works and teaching and because they had heard of the miracle of the resurrection of Lazarus. When they heard that Christ was entering the city, they went out to meet Him with palm branches, laying their garments on the ground before Him, and shouting, "Hosanna! Blessed is he that comes in the Name of the Lord, the King of Israel!"

At the outset of His public ministry Jesus proclaimed the kingdom of God and announced that the powers of the age to come were already active in the present age (Lk 7:18-22). His triumphant entry into Jerusalem is a messianic event, through which His divine authority was declared.

Palm Sunday summons us to behold our king: the Word of God made flesh. We are called to behold

Him not simply as the One who came to us once riding on a colt, but as the One who is always present in His Church, coming ceaselessly to us in power and glory at every Eucharist, in every prayer and sacrament, and in every act of love, kindness and mercy. He comes to free us from all our fears and insecurities, "to take solemn possession of our soul, and to be enthroned in our heart," as someone has said. (...) He is the King, who liberates us from the darkness of sin and the bondage of death. Palm Sunday summons us to behold our King: the vanquisher of death and the giver of life.

Palm Sunday summons us to accept both the rule and the kingdom of God as the goal and content of our Christian life. We draw our identity from Christ and His kingdom - His indescribable power, boundless mercy and incomprehensible abundance given freely to man. The kingdom does not lie at some point or place in the distant future. In the words of the

"Sitting on Your throne

in Heaven, carried on a foal on Earth, O Christ God, accept the praise of angels and the songs of children who sing: Blessed is He who comes to recall Adam."



Scripture, the kingdom of God is not only at hand (Mt 3:2; 4:17), it is within us (Lk 17:21). The kingdom is a present reality as well as a future realization (Mt 6:10).

The kingdom of God is the life of the Holy Trinity in the world. It is the kingdom of holiness, goodness, truth, beauty, love, peace and joy. These qualities are not works of the human spirit. They proceed from the life of God and reveal God. Christ Himself is the kingdom.

In the moments of exuberance that marked Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, the world received its King, the king who was on His way to death. His Passion, however, was no morbid desire for martyrdom. Jesus' purpose was to accomplish the mission for which the Father sent Him. *goarch.org*





UKRAINIAN GOVERNMENT REAFFIRMS AUTOCEPHALY

Ukrainian President Petro Poroshenko's adviser, Director of National Institute for Strategic Studies Rostyslav Pavlenko has said the Ecumenical Patriarch will not revoke a tomos of autocephaly of the Orthodox Church of Ukraine (OCU) unless the OCU, itself, insists on amending the document. "Both in the tomos and in the charter of the church there is a provision stating that everything that happens in the independent Ukrainian church should take place in accordance with the tomos and the statute. If the conditions of the tomos are not violated, if the church does not revise it and does not make changes regarding the tomos's provisions, there can be no revocation, " he told Radio Liberty's Ukrainian Service.



"Neither President Poroshenko not the state interferes in internal church relations," Pavlenko said, commenting on the statement of Honorable Patriarch of the Orthodox Church of Ukraine (OCU) Filaret, who claimed that "Poroshenko has retreated from the agreements reached and actually agreed to liquidate the Kyiv Patriarchate."

"The Kyiv Patriarchate was liquidated as a religious association on December 15, i.e. an association of various religious organizations that make up the Kyiv Patriarchate. The decision on this was made by the Local Council of the Kyiv Patriarchate, and the Ministry of Culture completed all necessary procedures in January of this year, establishing either actually or legally the Kyiv Patriarchate does not exist as a church," Pavlenko said.

As reported earlier, Filaret insists the Kyiv Patriarchate has retained registration with the state bodies. At the same time, the Ministry of Culture assured the Ukrainian Orthodox Church of the Kyiv Patriarchate was liquidated on December 15, 2018 during the Unification Council. [source: unian.info]


